MAAN Updates

Wow, what a year it has been! I wanted to take this opportunity to highlight some exciting accomplishments for our organization over this past year. We continue to grow within the Mason community thanks to the commitment of our membership.

I am pleased to announce that MAAN has been approved as an official allied member of the National Academic Advising Association (NACADA). Allied membership with NACADA, encourages cooperation and joint programming with other organizations that support the purposes of NACADA. This partnership raises Mason's profile at the national level, as we are now one of two allied organizations in NACADA's Region 2 (DE, MD, NJ, PA, VA). MAAN also joins the ranks of the other 40 organizations recognized as allied members.

This is just one of our many steps forward this year. While continuing our already successful programs such as the Mason Advisor Certificate (MAC), Registration Awareness Week (RAW), and Learn Over Lunch (LOL), MAAN was able to host the first ever Mason/VCCS Academic Advising Symposium to start conversations around transfer student success and transitions, generously supported by Dr. Janette Muir in the Provost Office and the 4VA Consortium. The symposium focused on sharing the Mason advising culture to highlight our unique advising structures that will allow our colleagues at other institutions to better prepare students transitioning to Mason. We specifically targeted First Year Advisors, Transfer Counselors, and Faculty Advisors from Northern Virginia Community College and had an impressive turn out with 69 attendees. MAAN has already received a commitment from the Provost Office to continue the Mason/VCCS Academic Advising Symposium for next year. We hope to not only expand our outreach within the Virginia Community College System but to also include more opportunities for Mason advisors to connect with our colleagues at other institutions.

Academic Advising Reform, lead by Dr. Jeannie Brown Leonard, continues to make strides in addressing student success within our community. Over the past year, Jeannie has taken the recommendations made by the committee, of which there were several members of MAAN, on a road show to all of the academic Colleges/Schools. One of the major victories was the unanimous approval of a new vision and mission of undergraduate academic advising (see: University Catalog 2015-2016):

Vision

Academic advising at George Mason University is an integral part of the educational process that enhances student learning and development by supporting, teaching, and connecting students to curricular and co-curricular experiences relevant to becoming an exemplary Mason Graduate: an engaged, reflective citizen and well-rounded scholar who is prepared to act.

Mission

The academic advising community at George Mason University commits to creating ongoing, personal and purposeful educational partnerships with students and colleagues. Advisors contribute to student success by providing resources and by teaching students to develop the skills required to become life-long learners capable of effective self-advocacy. Dedicated to putting students first and to being responsive, academic advisors:

- Support students in setting and reaching educational goals.
- Teach students to engage in a process of self-reflection and self-discovery, guiding them to find degree pathways that match their interests, skills, and abilities.
- Connect students to campus resources and co-curricular opportunities to integrate learning and experience.

The new vision and mission for advising provides a much clearer representation and direction of what is expected in the undergraduate advising experience. By strengthening the functions of academic advising, we can continue to improve our graduation and retention rates for our students. We also continue to strengthen our advising culture, providing a greater sense of well-being for our advisors.

I hope you all have a wonderful summer and keep an eye on the listserv for additional MAAN summer events. We look forward to another successful academic year!

Get more involved with NACADA:

For any of you who may be interested in finding out how to become more involved with NACADA, there is always a need in helping to plan and volunteer at the state and regional conferences.

NACADA also has an advisor mentorship program which begins each year at the regional conference. Mentors and mentees must apply to this competitive program. Each year mentees with under five years of advising experience are paired with a mentor with more than five years of advising experience. As a former NACADA mentor, I can tell you this is a very worthwhile program.

When you see vacancies in NACADA positions, such as state liaison or regional officer positions, apply.

I would also encourage everyone to submit presentation proposals for any NACADA conference. As someone who has presented at state, regional, and national NACADA conferences, I can tell you, Mason is viewed by others as doing a lot of great things in the profession of academic advising. We need to share our wealth of knowledge with other institutions across the country.

Advisor Spotlight

This month, we're highlighting Dr. Cathy Wright, Associate Professor, Undergraduate Academic Advising Director for the Department of Communication, and Director of the Florence and Milan Study Abroad Programs.

What is your background/education?

I have a PhD in Communication (emphasis on New Technology), an MA in Mass Communication from Texas Tech with a focus in Public Relations and Advertising, and my undergraduate was a BS in Business Communication from Phillips University.

How did you get involved in advising?

I got involved with advising as a favor to someone in the department about 8 or 9 years ago. She needed help with orientations and taught me the rudimentary skills to do so. I enjoyed working with the students and when I was asked if I would take on a few hours of advising every week, I agreed to do so. Over time, personnel changed and my then-chair asked me if I'd take on the part-time advising position in the department as the main advisor for almost 1000 students (majors and minors). Each semester, my advising position is contracted for 20 hours a week (but with that many students, it's a lot more!) and I also teach 2 classes. I love what I'm doing, it's a great job!



What are your advising interests?

Helping students avoid the Mason Shuffle and helping students realize their goals. I have found that advising is so much more than just sitting with the students and recommending classes. When I see people I've had in class or whom I've advised walk across the stage, that is the best thing for me! They did it and in some small way, I helped.

What are your career goals/aspirations?

Well.....I've wanted to teach for as long as I can remember, so I have achieved that goal. I work at an amazing university where I have a significant amount of support from my co-workers, advising peers, the greater GMU community and from my chair. I get to teach some amazing students and watch as they grow. In my advising position, I get to work with students to show them options they didn't know they had and help them reach their goals. So in this sense, I have reached those goals.

My future goals and aspirations is to continue to do what I am currently doing and to embrace future opportunities. If you'd have asked me 5 years ago if I'd be the Advising Director, I would have told you no....yet, here I am and I really enjoy doing it!

What is something surprising about you?

Hmmmm.....what's surprising about me is that I scuba dive. When our daughter moved out almost 3 years ago (she was 18) and our son was at college, I announced to my husband that I wanted to learn how to scuba dive. He was absolutely surprised, because I don't like the beach much because I burn easily. One of my greatest fears is drowning, so I decided to meet that fear head-on and learn how to dive. I have 71 dives in and have dived in the Grand Cayman, Honduras, Bonaire, in the Adriatic Sea and the Ligurian Sea (both off the coast of Italy), and the Florida Keys. We are planning a trip this fall, but haven't decided where.

I love diving because it's the closest thing you can get to flying! I have seen all sorts of amazing creatures and the geography under the water is amazing! One of the more interesting things I've done is a swim with sharks. My favorite dive was in Bonaire where I interacted with two squid for about 10 minutes at the end of a dive. It was amazing because the one squid purposely interacted with me...he initiated the interaction and the only reason I left was because it was the end of the dive and I needed to do my safety stop.
